Volmir Klock was born September 2, 1973 in Santa Rosa, Brazil, the son of Erno Alvicio Klock and Herondina Bueno Klock. Santa Rosa is a town in the Brazilian state of Rio Grande do Sul. The state is known as one of the most culturally rich states in Brazil. It's name means _"Great River of the South" and is the southernmost state of Brazil. It has the fourth highest population; in 2007 was about 263,403.



Santa Rosa is heavily populated with German-Brazilian descendants and the majority of the citizens exhibit Germanic features such as blond hair and blue eyes.

German immigration to Brazil started in 1824 - just after Brazil won independence from
Portugal. In 1828, the 28th Battalion of
Foreigners arrived, made up of hired Germans
soldiers to fight against the inhabitants of presentday Uruguay in the Cisplatine War. After the war

many of the soldiers decided to stay in Santa Maria beginning the German colonization. Some Brazilian states received higher inflows of Germans than others. Such was the case in Rio Grande do Sul, where the first "wave" of immigrants was settled in the 1820s. In 1827, a group of Germans migrated to Brazil from the region of Trier. Trier was territory originally within the German Empire of 1871 transferred to Belgium, Denmark, France, Lithuania, Poland, and Russia after WWI and WWII.

Volmir grandparents, Carlos Sobrinho Klock married Paulina Reckziegel and lived in the city of Estrela, Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil." Volmir told me.

Volmir works in the stainless steel industry, manufacturing milk cooling tanks, intended for agriculture. "I live for 35 years this city, and moved to town only once, when went live in 2002 in the city Horizontina." Volmir told me in his emails. Horizontina is a city in Rio Grande do Sul, in southern Brazil, with 18,046 inhabitants in a 2004. The first settlers of Horizontia were German, Italian and Polish immigrants who arrived in the region in 1927, the city was created only in 1955. Nowadays, most of the inhabitants are of German-Brazilian descent. While In Horizontia, Volmir worked in the agriculture industry driving a John Deere tractor and harvester, after two he years returned to the city of Santa Rosa.

In1991, Volmir married Mary Regina Lemos de Moura in Santa Rosa. Volmir and Regina have three children; Diana de Moura Klock was born on November 17, 1991; Felipe de Moura Klock was born July 29, 1994 and Oldison de Moura Klock was born August 25, 1997.

I do not know if Volmir is in any way connected to the Klocks of the United States, but his ancestors did come from Germany.



John Milton & Harriet Louisa (Klock) Bennett

John Milton Bennett was born January 18, 1844 in Lyme, Jefferson Co., New York the son of Peter Cornelius Bennett and Clarissa Steele. He called himself a Green Mountain Yankee, which would make you think he was born in Vermont. His mother Clarissa Steele was born in Vermont. John married Harriet Louisa (Hattie) Klock on July 12, 1866 in Three Mile Bay, Jefferson Co., New York. Hattie was the daughter of Harvey Klock (George G.I., George I., Johannes, Han Henrich and Hendrick Klock) and Harriet Yoran.

John was a Sunday school superintendent at what he called a Hard Shell Baptist Church. He was a Church clerk in Clayton, New York at the First Baptist Church.

John piloted an excursion boat called the S.S. Magic. The boat toured the islands on the St. Lawrence River. His brother James was the Captain. About 1896, John, Harriet and family moved to Bangor, Bay County, Michigan. John and Harriet had seven children; Albion Milton, born October 24, 1866 in Clayton, Jefferson County, New York. Albion died March 24, 1871 in Clayton and is buried in Clayton. Frankie Davis, born January 20, 1869 and died August 19, 1870, also buried in Clayton. Bernard Chester who was born July 08, 1871, married Anna French who was born in Canada. She died March 12, 1897. They had a daughter

Isabel Harriet. After the death of Anna, Bernard married Letta Raby. Bernard and Letta had two children. He passed away April 07, 1952. Mina Anna was born January 31, 1879. She was married three times, her first husband was Benjamin Jones. Nina and Benjamin had three children. She later married Harry May and Donald Goodchild. Mina died December 10, 1971 in Flint, Genesee Co., Michigan. Perley Walter Bennett was born March 20, 1881 in Clayton. He married Francis Ann Howell. They had seven children. After the death of Francis. Perley married Laura Van Akker. Ward D. Bennett was born August 19, 1883 and died November 15, 1972 in Kenmore, Niagara Co., New York. Ward married Katherine Rausch. She was born February 20, 1891 and died September 16, 1985. Both are buried in White Chapel Park, Buffalo, New York. They had two children. Lottie May was born July 25, 1887. She married Herman Van Dam. She died January 31, 1979 in Flint, Genesee, Michigan. Both are buried in Gracelawn Cemetery, Flint, Michigan.

All of his sons at one time worked for Hyatt Funeral home at 614 N. Jackson St., Bay City, Michigan. They answered the phones or drove for the funeral home.

John died February 10, 1919 in Flint, Michigan. Harried died October 13, 1940 in Detroit. Both are buried in Gracelawn Cemetery, Flint, Michigan

Henry Alden Klock was born July 5, 1927 in the Town of Dekalb, New York; the son of George Henry Klock (Bates Aaron, Luther, John J. Jr., John J., Johannes and Hendrick Klock) and Edna May Simmons Klock. He attended Antwerp and Potsdam schools. He was a veteran of WW-II., serving in the Army in Germany and was a member

of Silas Wainwright Post 6638, VFW and James Maloy Post, 65 of the American Legion.

Henry married Gladys L. Richer in May of 1949. Four children were born to this union; Morton Lee, Nancy, Katherine "Kathy" and Barbara Klock. Morton Lee Klock married Ramona Goodale and they had three children. Nancy married Robert Premo, two children. Kathy married William G. Lamere, two children and Barbara married Daniel W. Clark. The marriage of Henry Alden and Gladys ended in divorce and on August 15, 1969, Henry married Maria Tyler. Maria was married twice before and had six children from her previous marriages.

Henry operated dairy farms and for 19 years transported milk to the Borden Plant. He also worked at Corbin Lumber Company, was employed by International Talc and Gouverneur Company. 1973-1977 Henry worked as a driller for the Longyear Company.

Henry died September 14, 1977 at the Edward John Noble Hospital in Gouverneur, New York at the age of 50 from a cerebral hemorrhage. He was buried in Maple Grove Cemetery, Richville, St. Lawrence, New York. His first wife, Gladys L. Richer, was born September 16, 1927 and died January 02, 2002. His second wife, Maria Tyler Klock was born March 14, 1933 died December 15, 2002.

Clock, Myron A. died Aug. 15, 1871 aged 5 mo. Twin sons of Wm. H. and Alvira.

Additional Information: Myron A. Clock was the infant son of William (Henry, John I., Conrad Clock, and Hendrick Klock) and Alvira. I do not know the maiden name of Alvira.

Clock, Byron died Aug. 15, 1871 aged 5 mo. Additional Information: Byron was the twin brother of Myron above.

Clock, Conrad, Son of John. died Mar. 3, 1864 aged 55 yrs 5mo. Additional Information: Conrad was the son of John I. Clock (Conrad, Hendrick Klock) and Appolonia Keeler/Keller. Marriage and children: Unknown.

Clock, Peter, Son of John. died Aug. 22, 1862 aged? Additional Information:
Peter was the son of John I. Klock (Conrad, Hendrick Klock) and Appolonia Keeler or Keller and was born in 1796 and died August 22, 1862. He married Anna Ordendorf. Peter and Anna had nine children.

Clock, Melinda (Forbes) wife died Apr. 23, 1857 aged 48. Additional Information: Malinda Forbes was the daughter of Bartholemew Forbes. She married Adam Clock (John I., Conrad and Hendrick Klock) July 04, 1830. They had five children.

Clock, C Duane. Son of Adam. Died Oct. 10.1925 aged 70. Additional Information: Duane Clock (Adam, John I., Conrad and Hendrick Klock) was married twice, first to Grace T. Cady (below) and then to Hattie Wells. Duane and Grace Cady had five children. A set of twins died in infancy. No children with Hattie.
