The House that Cooper Built

The man in front of this house is Eugene Cooper. Eugene Cooper was a farmer, carpenter and inventor. He moved to Jamestown Township, Michigan with his family about 1866 or 67 and built the house above. The home was located in Jamestown Township, Michigan with Grandville on the east and Holland on the west. Jamestown was established in 1849. The home above no longer exists but there is one that Cooper built in Canada built in 1848 that still stands. There is a 1850 patent in Canada for a leaver action stump puller that was invented by Eugene Cooper.

It was not long after arriving in Jamestown that he built a Canadian wind-mill to operate a grist-mill, the first one in Jamestown. It was 70 feet in diameter with six sails each. six feet wide. He built all his own machinery. If the wind blew it would grind feed, saw wood, bale hay, grind apples for cider and thresh his grain. When the wind blew it would grind all night. He would fill the hopper, set the alarm and go to bed. When awakened by the alarm he would go and fill the hopper again and return to bed. In the Jamestown area he was known as Windmill Cooper.

Windmill Cooper was born in Cayuga County, New York on March 05, 1823 the son of

Dorman Cooper and Lucretia Lydia Shaw. He married Maria Phillips, daughter of Henry Phillips and Nancy Ann Clock. Maria was born October 20, 1830 in Ontario, Canada. The Coopers needed a large house in order to raise their eleven children. The home even had an elevator!

Maria Phillips was the granddaughter of Jacob Conrad Klock and Anna Eva Staring. Jacob and Anna Eva Staring were married February 19, 1774 in the Dutch Reformed Church, German Flatts Township, Herkimer, New York.

Jacob Klock served in the Continental Army as a second lieutenant in Captain Severinus Casselman's Company of the Kingsland and German Flatts District Regiment of the Tryon County Militia. He was taken prisoner

by the British on April 3, 1780 during the raid on Remensnyder's Bush. He was taken to Montreal, Canada where he signed up to fight for the British in the in the second battalion of the British Kings Royal Regiment of New York under Sir John Johnson. He was sent to attack the people of his home in the Mohawk Valley. Once in the valley he took advantage of an opportunity to escape. He deserted the British Army and returned home to his wife and family. Later, in 1802 Jacob and Anna returned to Canada to live.

Jacob Conrad Clock and Anna Staring had thirteen children. Some stayed in New York and some moved to Canada with them. Several of the descendants of Jacob Conrad Clock ended up in the state of Michigan.

I met Nancy Starr and Alice Tietema at the last Klock Reunion that was held at Fort Klock.

Nancy and Alice are descendants of Eugene Cooper who was born March 05, 1823 and died January 03, 1901. Maria "Phillips" Cooper was born October 20, 1830 and died December 26, 1896.

Nellie J. (Newman) Kennedy A Pioneer Mother of Crawford County, Iowa

Nellie J. Newman was born August 10, 1841 in New York, the daughter of Stephen F. Newman and Lovian Klock. Lovian was the daughter of John Beekman Klock (Jacob George, Johanguergh and Hendrick Klock) and Margaret Klock (Joseph G., George G., Johanguergh and Hendrick Klock).

In 1861, when Nellie was 20 years of age she moved to Illinois. On May 2, 1865 she moved to Crawford county, lowa, where she taught school. She was married on January 1, 1865 to David W. Kennedy. Her husband, David was born April 11, 1838, the son of Charles Kennedy. Charles was born in Ireland in April of 1790 and came to America in 1821. Charles located in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He was employed as a manufacture of trunks. In 1837 he moved with his family to Crawford County, lowa.

After her marriage Nellie came with her husband to Harrison county to enter upon the career of farming and homemaking. On March 1st 1865 they moved on a farm near Whitesboro, lowa and the family home was maintained in that neighborhood.

The pioneer conditions of the days immediately following the civil war were not pleasant, but women like Mrs. Kennedy did not complain. In addition to the duties of her own home she took upon herself at numerous times the work of a nurse and sometimes a doctor to the sick of the community. She did what she could to help alleviate suffering with her comforting hands, kind deeds and her helpful words.

Joy and sorrow came to the Kennedy home as well. David and Nellie were the parents of eight children.

Charles was born December 23, 1868. Charles married Esther Hansen and he became a pharmacist. Charles and Ester did not have any children, but they did adopted a daughter, Louise Grace.

George was born August 09, 1870. He married Irene McMinimee. They had a daughter they named, Nellie.

Merritt was born December 15, 1871. When Merritt was 25 he was working for the lowa Telephone Company in Avoca, lowa. He had climbed a pole to the height of seven feet when his hold slipped and he fell. It was this fall that caused his ultimately death a week later on February 2, 1900.

David E. Kennedy was born May 13, 1874 and died September 2 of that same year.

Lewis M. was born Feb. 17, 1876 and died January 22, 1882.

Minnie was born November 22, 1878. She married John Edward Massie and resided in Kansas City, Mo. They had five children. Minnie died January 07, 1973 in Fresno, California.

Marcus B. Kennedy was born August 31, 1881 and died in 1952 in Logan, Harrison County, Iowa He married Zella E. Miller who was born December 19, 1888 and passed away in Phoenix, Arizona in June 1972. No record of children.

Nellie May was born February 28, 1886 and died August 23, 1972. She married John F. Hanneman. No record of children.

David W. Kennedy died May 27, 1900 and his wife Nellie died April 21, 1929. They are buried in Greenwood Cemetery, Harrison County, Iowa.

I have to state in the very beginning the purpose of this email- curiosity about my surname. I myself am Peter Klock and live in Latvia (Europe, Baltic states) and have been researching the roots of this surname for quite a time. The problem was the fact that the surname in Latvian translates to that of Kloks (Klock), so up to this moment I thought that there are as few as 10-20 people having this surname. How wrong I was, huh? Well, just wanted to say that apparently those Dutch/ German emigrants loved not only United States, but also Livonia (at the time- under
