Adam Klock

Adam Amos Klock was born Aug. 12, 1926 at Fort Klock in St. Johnsville, New York. Adam was the last Klock born at Fort Klock when the fort was still in the hands of the Klock Family. He was born in the room which is now the living room at Fort Klock which is across from the trade room. At that time it was his parents bedroom. Adam's parents were Lipe Klock and Clara Fox. Lipe Klock was married twice. Lipe's first wife was Alma Nellis. Lipe and Alma had eight children. Lipe Klock and Clara Fox had three children. Adam is the youngest of Lipe Klock's children. Lipe Klock died Oct. 30, 1936 when Adam was only 10 years old.

I have met Adam several times over the last few years. Adam receives this newsletter and has told me I put out a real nice newsletter and that he enjoys reading it. Coming from a man like Adam that means a lot to me. I enjoy talking with him every chance I get. He is very knowledgeable and has a great memory. He can tell some great stories about the home where he was born. Adam attended the Old Fort Klock School until he was in the forth grade. He did not have to walk very far to go to school when he was young. It was only about 500 feet from his home.

Adam and his brother Lipe Jr., married twin sister. Adam married Lois and his brother Lipe Jr. married Louise Snell. After the death of his father in 1936 and the large barn had burned, his mother, with three small children could no longer make a living on the farm. She had to board up the old homestead and move into town with her children and take a job. After setting empty for a few years the fort fell into disrepair, window and doors were smashed out, walls crumbing, vandals were ripping boards and beams from the building and even railroad bums were building fires in the basement to keep warm. In 1950's The Tyron County Mussel Loaders Association (Later the Fort Klock Historic Restoration) were able to purchase Fort Klock and restore it to what it is today.

Adam told me he was really thankful to Skip Barshied Jr. and the Mussel Loaders who works so hard to restored the Fort and preserve it for history.. If it was not for them, the fort may not be here today.

I asked Adam what he remembered most about growing up on the family farm. He told me he remembered the Klock Family Reunions. The reunion were quite large when Adam was a young man. He had a large family. The group was called The Klock Family Association. His family would come from all over and set up tents in the yard across the stream **Continued Next Page**

from the house. He also remembers his mother planting flowers in the old stone sink. That sink is now back in the fort and in the kitchen of Fort Klock. Check out the pictures below. You can see the sink where Adam's mother planted the flowers.



Adam and his family still hold there reunions at the fort. The Klock Family Association put a plaque on a large stone by the road.

Below is what is written on this plaque.

KLOCK FORT

THE STONE DWELLING 500 FEET SOUTH WAS BUILT BY JOHANNIS KLOCK IN 1750 AND WAS USED AS A FORT AND PLACE OF REFUGE DURING THE REVLUTIONARY WAR.

THE BATTLE OF "KLOCK'S FIELD" WAS FOUGHT NEAR HERE TO THE WEST.

THIS TABLET PLACED AUGUST 25, 1927 BY THE KLOCK FAMILY ASSOCIATION IN MEMORY OF THEIR ANCESTERS WHO TOILED, SERVED AND SACRIFIED IN THIS MOHAWK VALLEY

Major Jacob Klock

Many of our ancestors served in the Civil War. Major Jacob Clinton Klock Was a descendent of Col. Jacob Klock. He joined the 153rd New York Volunteers September 1862 at Fonda, New York. At the age of 26 he was a Captain, and by the age of 28 he was a Major. He was in the Battle of Opequan Creek. They fought to gain possession of a ravine. The Union Army won the battle for the ravine but at a high cost. 1,940 men were killed or wounded. Captain Klock severely wounded, along with Captain Dewandilaer, took refuge in the home of a rebel Congressman. Captain Klock, for his bravery was promoted to Major and sent home to die. Major Klock died from his wounds in St. Johnsville, New York October of 1864.

The G.A.R. (Grand Army of the Republic) Post # 70 in Fort Plains, New York was named Post Klock in honor of Major Klock. The G.A.R. organization became a social and political force that helped shape the destiny of this nation for more than 60 years. This G.A.R. Post was open from June 24, 1864 to 1937. The rest of the G.A.R. Posts in New York disbanded in 1948.

The Original G.A.R., organized in 1866, would only admit men who had served honorably in the US military during the Civil War. This limited the life span of the G.A.R. In 1881 formed the S.V. (Son's of Union Veterans of the Civil War) to carry on their traditions and membership.
