Surprise Anniversary Party

I found an old newspaper clipping on the Internet (Ancestry.com) posted by Thomas LaClair about a surprise 30th anniversary party of Martin and Sally House Klock. There were several people who attended the party so I thought it might be fun to figure out the relationship of the people who attended the party.

The following are the names of the guests present: Rev. and Mrs. R. Barringer, Mrs. Peggyann Klock, John House, Sr., Mr. and Mrs. Jordan Klock and daughter Leone and son Lionel, Mr. and Mrs. Will Klock and daughter Fern, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Klock, Mrs. Martha Klock, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Klock, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Fults and daughter, Iva Mae, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Peck, Elmer Klock, Mrs. Marv Herrington, Everst Cook, Mr. and Mrs. Will Clark and daughter Beulah, Mr. and Mrs. Lester and son Jesse, Mr. and Mrs. Burton Clark and son Kenneth, Fred Haynes, Edward Haynes, Charlie Bartlett, Lester Piper, Miss Lottie Bartlett, Vol. Amond, Mrs. Jackie Johnson and Charles Dickout.

Martin Klock was born March 01, 1852 the son of Levi and Peggy Ann Zeller. Levi was the son of Jacob (Adam, Adam Johannes, Col. Jacob Klock and Hendrick Klock) and Catherine Klock.

About 1876 Martin married his cousin Sally M. House. Sally was born June 02, 1856. Sally

was the daughter of Ephraim House and Delila M. Klock (Henry, Adam Johannes, Col. Jacob Klock and Hendrick Klock). Ephraim and Delila had five children.

On Friday evening, August 8, 1906, the family and friends of Martin and Sally Klock gave them a surprise 30 year anniversary party. The couple was presented with \$12.50 to purchase a gift as a remembrance of the happy occasion.

Martin was a farmer and lived in Orleans Four Corners, Jefferson Co., New York. Martin and Sally had five children; Jason, born September 26, 1881 married Minnie Parker on June 21, 1911. Charles Elmer, Ina May, Alta Delila and Frank E. Klock.

Ina May and Alta Delila married brothers, Ina May married Fred William Haynes and Alta Delila married Edward P. Haynes. I have Alta and Edward with one child and Ina and Fred with four children. Ina and Alta and their spouses attended the anniversary party for their parents.

Attending the anniversary party were his widowed mother, Peggy Ann Zeller Klock. Martin's father, Levi was born November 19, 1819 and died May 04, 1891 and was buried in Oakwood Cemetery, Theresa, New York.

Also in attendance at the anniversary party was Sally's brother, John House. John married Mary Hunt and had eight children.

Martin's brother, Jordan C. and his wife, Cora Bergen Klock, daughter Leone and son Lionel also attended. Jordan and Cora had two other children, Gladys and Lutie. Lutie died young.

Will (Willard) Klock, his wife, Adele P. Myers Klock and their only daughter Fern attended the party. Fern was born June 16, 1893 and in 1922 married Charles Richardson. Two children were born to this union.

Charles, son of Martin and Sally, attended with his wife, Melissa Bartlett. Charles Elmer and Melissa had two children, both born after the anniversary party, Clarence born October 15, 1909 and Florence born April 08, 1919.

Martin's Aunt and Uncle, Andrew Fults and their daughter, Iva Mae were also in attendance. Andrew Fults was the son of John W. Fults and Nancy Klock. Nancy was the sister of Levi Klock. Martin's daughter, Caroline Klock married a Joseph W. Fults. I am not sure how or even if Andrew and Joseph were related.

According to the article there was an Elmer Klock who attended. This may have been Elmer Edison Klock. He was the son of Henry D. Klock (Adam, Jacob Adam, Adam, Adam Johannes, Col. Jacob Klock and Hendrick Klock) and Margaret Hagen. He lived in Orleans Four Corners, Jefferson Co. Elmer married Fanny Sanford about three months after the anniversary party. Elmer and Fanny had three children.

There was also a Mrs. Martha Klock attending the party. This may have been Martha, widow of Adam and the mother of Henry D. Klock.

I don't know the relationship to Martin and Sally Klock of Rev. and Mrs. R. Barringer, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Klock, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Peck, Mrs. Marv Herrington, Everest Cook, Mr. and Mrs. Will Clark and daughter Beulah, Mr. and Mrs. Lester and son Jesse, Mr. and Mrs. Burton Clark and son Kenneth, Charlie Bartlett, Lester Piper, Miss Lottie Bartlett, Vol. Amond, Mrs. Jakie Johnson and Charles Dickout. Sounds like it was a nice party.

Martin and Sally lived to celebrate their golden wedding on the farm homestead. The Klock farm was located about two miles south of Orleans Four Corners. Sally died April 06, 1920. Martin was born on the Klock homestead and always resided there until 1920 when he moved in with his son, Charles who lived in Ogdensburg. Martin Klock died in the Ogdensburg hospital Friday July 30, 1926, following an operation the day before.

Martin and Sally as well as other members of

this Klock family were buried in the same plot in Oakwood cemetery.

All family trees have errors; typing errors, dates of birth and death, people in the wrong family line, spelling of names, etc. I received an e-mail from Kristen Bowe who lives in Canastota New York. Her maternal grandfather was Kenneth Olcott, his mother was Grace Belle Clock. Grace's father was Harley Raymond Clock son of Michael Clock (Peter, John I, Conrad and Hendrick Klock)

Kristen was asking about the information I have on Harley Kilmer Clock on my tree on the Klock Connections Web Site.

"I was wondering if in Klock Connections Part 5, 300 it says Harley Kilmer Clock married Addie Leggett. It has from newspaper on death of Frank Clock. I have from my grandmother's Bible Harley Raymond Clock. Harley's father as Michael Clock and Catherine Raymond. There is mention someplace of Catherine and Michael adopting a family members child. I was wondering if Harley is same person or 2 separate Harley's. If you can help me in anyway it would be greatly appreciated as that is as far back as I have discovered."

I had the following Obituary of Frank M. Clock which was published in the Canastota Bee. The obituary was dated April 21, 1960.

"Hold Services for Frank M. Clock, 67

Frank M. Clock, 67, was found dead Thursday morning in the barn on his farm located at the

intersection of the Roberts St. Rd. and Court St. Rd. Troop D. State Police BCI investigated.

Dr. Kinsella said death was due to multiple skull fractures and brain laceration inflicted by a firearm. He gave a verdict of "death due to suicide."

Born April 5, 1893, at the farm where he resided all his live. Clock was the son of Addie Leggett and Harley Clock. He resided with his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Allen Olcott. Mr. Clock never married.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church, Canastota, the Canastota Lodge 231, F. and A.M.; and of the Wampsville Fire Department.

Funeral services were held at the family home Monday, the Rev. Elwood Case, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Canastota, officiating. Interment was in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery, Canastota.

Funeral arrangements were handled by the Newberry Funeral Home.

I had a Harley Kilmer Clock married to Addie Leggett on my tree and the parents of Harley as David Henry Clock and Emmeline Bishop. After the e-mail from Kristen and some additional research; looks like there were two Harley Clock's. One was the son of Michael, the other the son of David. Harley (son of David) was born about 1860 and Harley, the son of Michael was born about 1871. Frank Clock was the son of Harley (son of Michael and Catherine Raymond). He married and Addie Leggett. This was in error and I have changed my tree. I do not know if Frank was adopted by Harley and Addie Clock.

In researching this mistake in my family tree, Kristen told me about her Great Uncle, Raymond Olcott. Raymond was the son of Allen Olcott and Grace Belle Clock (Harley Raymond, Michael, Peter, John I., Conrad Clock and Hendrick Klock) "Raymond died in a train accident as a teen/ young adult. I have been trying to find any kind of report on the train accident but I apparently do not know where to look. I know he was on his way to his girlfriends and had thought that the train had already passed by." Kristen told me in her e-mails. "In his defense, I have seen a photo of her and she was really beautiful. So I would have been in

a hurry to see her also." Kristen told me. I found the write up that was in the Syracuse Herald, Thursday Evening, August 30, 1934 and e-mailed it to Kristen.

Raymond was 20 years old when he died. He was killed when the Dewitt Clinton, known as the eastbound passenger train 56, on the New York Central track, struck the car which he was driving at the Wampsville crossing. According to the article, Raymond "was employed by Madison County Highway Department, was driving south in a light sedan, when the train, east on track 2, crashed into the car, carrying it about a mile before it could be brought to a stop."

"That train tracks are about a half mile or so from his home. His parents probably heard the crash." Kristen told me.

Both are tragic stories. Thank you Kristen for filling me in on your family line and for letting me know about the mistake in my tree. --Dave

Another Correction

Last month in the article "Climbing Your Family Tree" I said that Anna Zimmerman who married Abner Read was born in 1770 and would have been 7 years when the battle of Oriskany took place and 17 when the battle of Klock's field took place. The Battle of Oriskany took place August 6, 1777 and the Battle of Klock's field took place three years later on October 19, 1780. Anna would have been 10, not 17 during the Battle of Klock's Field.

Klock Adam b. Nov. 17, 1825, d. Sept. 29, 1901, married Martha Clock. Additional Information: Adam was the son of Jacob Adam (Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob, and Hendrick Klock) Martha Clock was the daughter of Jacob Klock (Henry, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob, and Hendrick Klock) I have them with two children; Henry D., and Jacob Merton. They also could be the parents of Francina who was born in 1848.

Klock, Burton died Jan 12, 1872, 11 months and 10days old, son of Eliger & Emily. Additional Information: Burton was the son of Elijah Klock (Jacob Adam, Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob, and Hendrick Klock) and Emily Cartwright.

Klock, Catherine died 1863, aged 39 yrs. 6 months and 21 days. No Additional Information.

Klock, Catherine (Gray) died 1873, aged 73 yrs. 6 months 4 days, wife of Jacob A. Klock Additional Information: Catherine Gray married Jacob Adam Klock (Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob, and Hendrick Klock)

Klock, Jacob A. died April 6, 1879, aged 78 years. Additional Information: Jacob Adam Klock was the son of Adam, (Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob, and Hendrick Klock). He married Catherine Gray above.

Klock, Lulu 1887- 1907. No additional information.

Klock, Samuel d. Feb. 23, 1863, aged 39 yrs. 6 mo. 21 days, son of Jacob and Catherine. Additional Information: Samuel was the son of (Jacob Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob, and Hendrick Klock). Note: the date and age of the Catherine Klock above. "aged 39 yrs. 6 months and 21 days." Most of the information for the list comes from cemetery information I found on line. Volunteers go out to these cemeteries and check cemetery records and take information from the head stones. Sometimes the stones are hard to read. I wonder if Catherine and Samuel information came from a large family type stone and the above Catherine is Catherine Gray Klock and the other Catherine is really Samuel.

Timmerman, Mary (Klock) b. June 1, 1784 d. 4 Feb. 1872, wife of Fred. Additional Information: Mary Klock (George G., Johanguergh "Old George" and Hendrick Klock) married Frederick Timmerman. Frederick and Mary had 11 children.

Timmerman, Frederick b. April 19, 1786, d. Feb 28, 1860. Additional Information: Frederick Timmerman married Mary Klock above.

Town of Orleans. Grove Cemetery Jefferson County, New York

Klock, Adele (Constock) b. April 18, 1922, d. Dec. 6, 1993, wife of Ivan. Additional Information: Adele married Ivan Lewis Klock in the Lutheran Church in Whitesboro on May 05, 1950. Ivan and Adele had five children.

Klock, Adele (Myers) b. Apr. 25, 1866, d. May 26, 1935, wife of Willard. Additional Information: Adele Myers married Willard Klock (Levi, Jacob Adam, , Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob Klock and Hendrick Klock). I have them with one child; Fern who married Charles Richardson.

Klock, Ivan L. b. Nov. 6, 1910, d. Jan. 15, 2002 married May 15, 1950, WW2 Army Vet. Additional Information: Ivan Lewis Klock was the son of Jacob Merton Klock (Adam, Jacob Adam, Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob Klock and Hendrick Klock.) and Lucy Ortleib Klock. He married Adele Bernice Comstock, above. He was a WW- II, Army Vet. He served in the Army from March 24, 1941 to April 1945 and was stationed in the Panama Canal Zone, Caledonia and Australia. He was a member of the Klock-Smith American Legion Post # 1788, which was named in part for his brother, Clair, who was killed in Germany during WW-11. He was an avid hunter and fisherman. He owned a Moble Station which he purchased in 1949 and drove truck for the town of Orleans. He worked at the Foote gas station before entering the Army. He was a member of the LaFargeville Fire Department.

Klock, Joseph W. b. Feb 23, 1914, d. July 1, 1950. Additional Information: Joseph Klock was the son of Lionel Klock and Lottie Helen Babcock. (See line of Joseph Klock under Lionel on next page) Joseph never married and did not have any children.

Klock , Lionel R. b. Oct. 25, 1894 d. 1932, son of Jordon & Cora (Bergen). Additional Information: Lionel Klock (Jordan C., Levi, Jacob Adam, Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob Klock and Hendrick Klock). I have Lionel born Oct. 25, 1894 and died in 1978. Lionel married Lottie Helen Babcock (below) and they did have a son Linnell R., who was born August 06, 1932. He may have died young and this is really the son, Linnell or Lionel. Lionel's wife, Lottie (see below) also died in 1932 which would make me think that she died in child birth with the birth of their son, Lionel or Linnell. Social Security Death Index has Lionel Klock, Last Residence: 13605 Adams, Jefferson, New York. Born: 25 Oct 1893 Last Benefit: 13605 Adams, Jefferson, New York. Died: Dec 1978

Klock, Lottie H. (Babcock) b. Jan 31, 1894, d. 1932, wife of Lionel R. Additional Information: Lottie Babcock married Lionel (above). They had six children; Joseph W., Marie Lottie who married Dennis I. Gibbs; Melvin; Francis Ross; Robert C., and Linnell R. Klock.

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
