Margot Klock Bevens

Margot "Marge", "Peg" Klock Bevens passed away on January 19, 2013 surrounded by her family.

Marge's father, John Klock was the son of Lipe Klock, and a member of the last family of Klocks who lived at Fort Klock. She enjoyed stopping at the fort during her trips to the area to visit with relatives and decorate graves in St. Johnsville and Ft. Klock cemeteries. She also attended family reunions, some for all Klocks and some just for the members of the Lipe Klock family. She maintained a wall in her dining room with photos and drawings of the fort and the Klock family coast of arms. She was very proud to be a direct descendant of some of the early Mohawk Valley settlers and Revolutionary War Patriots.

She was born in Syracuse on September 10, 1932. She lived in Solvay and was a member of the Solvay Fire Department. She is survived by

her brothers John (Cathy) Klock and Walter (Frances) Klock and a sister, Evelyn Klock marriage: Ken (Connie) Richards, Ron (Patty) Richards, Marjory Richards Yelton and Michael (Maureen) Richards. She married her husband Larry 'Red' Bevens in 1968 and took his children as her own. They include Maureen Bevens Procopio, Kathy Bevens Procopio, Larry Bevens and Mary Jane (Paul) Bevens Cavano. She has 12 grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren, several nieces, nephews and cousins. Her children said of her that she always told them, "If I can look in the mirror at the end of the day and ask myself, 'Did I hurt anyone today?' and the answer was 'no', then that was a good day." She was buried in Onondaga County Veterans Cemetery.

Additional Information: Margot was the daughter of John Lipe Klock (Lipe, Amos, Adam I., John J., Johannes and Hendrick Klock) and Marguerite Mary Wardell. John Lipe Klock was born August 05, 1899 and passed away April 1979. His first job was in the old St. Johnsville Theater. He was a projectionist for the silent movies. His wife Marguerite played the piano for the theater.

Later he moved to Syracuse where he was employed in the same capacity until his retirement.

Marge was the youngest of six children; Valetta Alma was born February 20, 1921 and

It will not be long and Fort Klock will open its doors for its 51th season. Darla and I look forward to returning to Fort Klock and the Mohawk Valley for another season as the Site Interpreters.

Fort Klock Historic Restoration is an organization composed ordinary citizens who have banded together to preserve this historic site. Fort Klock is not state or federally owned. The membership of Fort Klock Historic Restoration owns Fort Klock. The largely original house has been restored and in 1973 was designated a National Historic Landmark, a site "of exceptional value in Commemorating or illustrating the history of the United States. Fort Klock is a non profit (501--C-3) organization. An

educational institution chartered by the Board of Regents of the New York State Education Department. Our primary goal is to preserve and accurately interpret our unique historic site. Fort Klock Historic Restoration 2013 Calendar of Events

May 27--Opening Day/Colonial Craft Fair:
10:00 am to 4:00 pm.

The Tryon County Militia will drill and shoot their muskets. These Militia re-enactors are living historians who pay tribute by portraying those early colonists who fought for liberty during the Revolutionary War. The barn frame loom will be "dressed" for the season by members and weaver friends. This is a hand-on task that visitors are invited to participate in. Parking, and entrance to historic site is free. Donations are accepted and appreciated.

June 8 & 9--Blacksmith Shop--Hammer-In: 10 am--4 pm. All blacksmiths invited to attend and demonstrate their specialty at creating items from iron. The public is invited to watch this preserved craft in action from early days. Admission to Hammer-in is free, donations are accepted and appreciated. There will be a charge for admission and tour of historic farmhouse, \$3.00 for adults and \$1.00 for school age children.

July 4--Independence Day Celebration and Strawberry Festival: 12 to 4 p.m. The Declaration of Independence will be read at 1:00 pm followed by a musket salute by the Tryon County Militia. To add to the enjoyment of the day strawberries, homemade cakes, ice cream, strawberry shortcake and refreshments for a small fee.

July 26--Stone Soup Musical Concert: 7:00 pm. Come and enjoy these popular, local musicians play a variety of traditional blues, original folk songs. There is always a bit of wit thrown in to add a little zing. Featured are Susanne Bladek, vocalist and guitar, Dave Bladek on drums and

harmonica, Joseph Sinchak on Mandolin, Nick Friers on guitar, Peter Liljeberg on bass. This concert is held in the Dutch barn where the acoustics add to this musical jamboree. Please bring a lawn chair for your comfort. After the concert our site interpereters, Dave and Darla Klock will give a late night tour of the historic farmhouse. The Musical Concert and tour is free. Donations accepted and very much appreciated.

August 6,7, and 8 -- Young Pioneer Program: 9 am to 3 pm. The Young Pioneer Program is an educational program for children ages 9 through 13. The children will experience frontier life and colonial lifestyles while having a fun time learning hands-on activities. The program is limited to 20 children so please register in advance. To register call the fort (518-568-7779). If no answer, please leave a message. Please register before July 23. A small fee is charged.

September 7 & 8 -- Giant Two Day Craft Fair: Saturday 10 am to 5 pm. Sunday 10 am to 4 pm. Over 100 Talented artisans and crafters will offer their creations. This is one of the best craft fairs in the entire north east area. Food is available. Admission and parking is free.

December 1--St. Nicholas Day Celebraton on Sunday from 12:00 noon to 3:30 pm This rich tradition was brought to America by the early Dutch and Palatine German settlers. It is celebrated at Fort Klock and precludes the holiday season. It is a special day for children as St Nicholas will have a ornament for each child. Bundle up your family and come celebrate this rich heritage with St. Nicholas. There will be warm fires, spiced cider, hot chocolate, cookies and gingerbread. There will be storytelling, colonial music and militia drills.

Klock, Emma C. --b. 1900 d. 1990. Emma married Norman C. Klock, born about 1901, d. March 1946.

Klock, Frances M. Downing --b. 1841 d. 1915 (Find a Grave) Additional Information: Frances Downing married Robert Klock (1837-- 1908) , son of Simeon Klock, (Henry J., John J., Johannes and Hendrick Klock)and Eunice Easterbrook.

Klock, George W. --b. unknown d. Aug., 1902 (Find a Grave) Additional Information: George Klock/Clock was the son of Conrad Clock (John I. Clock, Conrad Clock, Hendrick Klock) Born 1835.

Klock, Harriett M. --b. unknown d. Jun., 1917 (Find a Grave) Additional Information: Harriett Smith married George Klock/Clock (son of Conrad Clock (John I. Clock, Conrad Clock, Hendrick Klock)

Klock, Helena--b. unknown d. Mar., 1919 (Find a Grave)

Klock, Leota M. --b. 1900 d. unknown (Find a Grave) Wf of Earl D., perhaps after his death married Alfred Yokey

Klock, Norman C. --b. unknown d. Mar., 1946 (Find a Grave) Additional Information: There was a Norman C. Klock, son of Eugene Klock (Norman Klock, Simeon Klock) Simeon born abt. 1812. I do not have the parents of this Simeon...

Klock, Robert --b. 1837 d. 1908 (Find a Grave) Additional Information: , Robert was the son of Simeon Klock, (Henry J., John J., Johannes and Hendrick Klock)and Eunice Easterbrook. He married Frances Downing.

Klock, Vilett--B. 1843-d. 1920(Find a Grave) Violet Smith married Dewitt Klock, son of Conrad Clock (John I. Clock, Conrad Clock, Hendrick Klock).

Adella J Klock B. 1861 D. 1940. Additional Information: Adella J. Keys married Clarence Klock (below).

Alma A Klock B.Sep. 22, 1842, D. Apr. 26, 1923. Additional Information: Alma Alice Rich married Henry S Klock.

Andrew W Klock B. 1830, D. 1901. Additional Information: Andrew W. Klock was the son of Simeon Klock (Henry J., John J., Johannes and Hendrick Klock) and Eunice Easterbrook. He married Harriet F. Burleson and they had three children.

Clarence Klock, B. 1858, D. 1927. Additional Information: Clarence Klock was the son of Andrew W. Klock and Harriet F. Burleson. He married Adella J. Keys. I have no record of any children.

Eunice Klock, B. unknown, D. Mar. 27, 1876. Additional Information: Eunice Easterbrook married Simeon Klock, below. She was born September 1810 and died March 27, 1876. Simeon and Eunice had four children.

Frankie Klock, B. 1866, D. 1866. No Information

Harriet Klock, B. 1838, D. 1899. Additional Information: Harriet F. Burleson married Andrew W. Klock above.

Harry S. Klock, B. May 3, 1865, D. May 19, 1896. Additional Information: Harry S. Klock was the son of Henry S. Klock and Alma Alice "Rich" Klock.

Henry H. Klock, B. unknown, D. Oct. 17, 1879 age: 75 yrs. Henry H. Klock was the son of Henry J. Klock (John J., Johannes and Hendrick Klock) and Margaret Rouse.

Henry S.+ Klock, B. Oct. 2, 1832, D. Apr. 23, 1910. Additional Information: Henry S. Klock was the son of Simeon Klock (Henry J., John J., Johannes and Hendrick Klock) and Eunice Easterbrook. Henry married Alma Alice Rich. Henry and Alma had five children.

Martha F Klock, B. Feb. 2, 1867, D. Oct. 22, 1928. No Information

Simeon Klock, B. unknown, D. Apr. 23, 1890 age: 83 yrs. Additional Information: Simeon was the son of Henry J. Klock (John J., Johannes and Hendrick Klock). He married Eunice Easterbrook. Four children were born from this union.

Tompkins County New York Ithaca City Cemetery, Ithaca

Clinton, Sarah Clock b. 1833 d. 1880. Additional Information: Sarah was the daughter of Hiram Clock (1794-1877) and Sarah E. Clock (1804-) She married Miles L. Clinton (1827-1904) They had a daughter Belle that married Ebenzer Mack Treman.

Clock, Fred L. b. Dec., 1864 d. Sep. 30, 1936. Additional Information: Fred L. Klock was the son of Henry L. Clock (Peter Clock John I. Clock Conrad Clock and Hendrick Klock) and Susan Matilda Barker.

Clock, Hiram b. Oct. 6, 1794 d. Sep. 10, 1877. Additional Information: Hiram Clock married Sarah Unknown. They had a daughter, Sarah (1833-1880) who married (Miles L Clinton (1827 - 1904)

Clock, Sarah E b. Dec. 16, 1804 d. unknown Additional Information: Sarah married Hiram Klock above. **Continued Next Month**
