

Genealogy: A Klock Family Report

In March, Jay Klock who live is Burington, Iowa sent me a package. The package contained a Klock Family Report. It is about 25 pages, written by Walter "Soap" Klock between 1956 and 1972. As far as Uncle Soap has been able to trace his tree back is to Amos Klock who was born November 30, 1837. Amos married Sarah Ann Jordan. Amos and Sarah Ann Klock lived in Pennsylvania.

New York and Pennsylvania have more Klock families in them than any other state in the Union. New York has the most with Pennsylvania coming in second.

Jay Klock is looking for information on his line. I have put this family report on my new web page. We are hoping someone will see it who can fill in the blank spaces.

In Walter (Soap) Klock search he contacted his Aunt Rena. She was the only living child of Amos and Sarah Jordan. He shared parts of her letter in his Klock Family Report. I would like to share it with you. The letter was written about 1956.

Dear Walter:

It is with much pleasure that I received a letter from one of my few relatives after so many years of silence. I am glad to here of your ambition to make a study of the Klock tribe. I am afraid I can give you very little help--being one of the youngest of our family of nine children. The first residence of the Klock family in this country was in Shamokin, Pa. The Potter County residence was that of mother and father when they married. Shamokin was the home of dad's parents - but I don't know the date - in fact, I never saw any of dad's people excepting half-brother who visited up in Emporium when I was about seven years old (1881) and they brought my sister, Jennie, and me a wonderful set of dishes of which

They were the children of a second marriage name LeVan or Lewon. Mother's people lived in Driftwood where I visited them and found Grandmother Jordan (mother's mother) to be a grand old lady and very sweet to us kids. As for the foreign residence, I know nothing about where father's people lived before coming to Southern Pennsylvania other than dad's people originally came from Germany. I understand his people spoke only German among themselves. Dad said they were originally Dutch (Holland). One of our friends in Buffalo who was asking about my people and the name of Klock said it was not a German name, but Dutch, so I presume they were right. I passed a huge cemetery last summer (1955) while driving through Northeast New York. In passing near Utica I saw a least 15 grave stones with the name Klock on them. As for photos of my people - my oldest sister (Ida LuElla) I believe has them all - she is dead, but her daughter, Cora, (Mrs. Cora Fuller) who lives in Lynchburg, Va. had several of them. I'm sorry I cannot be of more help. I've lost track of my family, I am now past 80 years and don't remember events as I used to. My older sister, Virginia, (Jen) has recently passed away. She had many photos, etc., but I have no idea where she left them. The Hudson Company of Detroit may know. I wish I could be of more help to you. If I think of something later I will forward it to you. Let me know sometime how you make out- and Best Wishes from your Aunt Rena Fairbain'. The nickname "Soap" sounds familiar, but I just can't place it. I know I have seen it someplace before. I do not have a Amos Klock that married Sarah Jordan on my family tree and I have looked in other reference books that I have as well, no luck.. I found him on the 1880 Census in Pennsylvania. Adam Klock was 42. His wife Sarah was 38. Adam was listed as a Car Inspector and says he and

his family were born in Pennsylvania. The following children are listed with him; Elmer-18, Arthur 14, Grace 12, Ora 10, Jennie 6, Rena 5, and Irvin 2.

To read more about the family of Amos Klock and Sarah Ann Jordan check out my web page. I do not know if this Amos Klock is connected back to Hendrick Klock or it is a totally different Klock Family. Maybe with your help we can help Jay fill in the blanks on his Klock Family Report.

Charles S. Kennedy, MD

Charles S. Kennedy, was born December 23, 1886 in Jefferson township, Harrison County, Iowa. He was educated in the common schools of Harrison county and in the high school at Logan, Iowa. After high school he took a commercial course at Omaha, graduating on July 16, 1890. He became a registered pharmacist on March 3, 1896. He worked as a pharmacist and later entered the John A. Creighton Medical College at Omaha. He graduated with the class of 1902. He opened his medical practice in Logan, Iowa where he continued to practice medicine for many years

Dr. Charles Kennedy married Esther Hansen on September 12, 1900. Ester was the daughter of Ingvert and Kate (Sorensen) Hansen. Charles and his wife Ester had no children, but they did adopt a daughter, Louise Grace. Charles was the secretary of the Harrison County Medical Society for a number of years. He was also a member of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, is a Knight Templar, at Council Bluffs. He was also a member of the Shrine of Abu Bekr, at Sioux City. He was a member of Ivanhoe Commandeers, at Council Bluffs and a member of the Royal Arch Masons, at Missouri Valley. He was also a member of the order of the Eastern Star.

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Dr. Charles Kennedy Continued

Dr. Charles Kennedy considered himself a Progressive-Republican but believed the man and the issue should be paramount to the party affiliation. He was also a Member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of the Later-Day Saints.

Source: Information for this article is from the 1915 Harrison County Iowa History on page 960, 961, 962. I ran across it on the internet. Dr. Charles Kennedy was alive when the History was written in 1915 so I can not give you his date of death. Dr. Charles Kennedy "Klock Connection" would go like this. Dr. Charles Kennedy was the son David W. Kennedy and Nellie J. Newman. Nellie J. Newman was the daughter of Stephen J. Newman and Lovina Klock. Lovina had a double connection back to Hendrick Klock. Lovina was the daughter of John Beekman Klock and Margaret Klock. John Beekman Klock was the son of Jacob George Klock, Jacob George was the son of Johanguergh (Old George) and Old George was the son of Hendrick Klock. Margaret Klock was the daughter of Joseph Klock; Joseph was the son of George G. Klock, and George was the son of Johanguergh (Old George) and again, Old George was the son of Hendrick Klock...

David W. Kennedy and Nellie J. (Klock) Newman had eight children. Dr. Charles Kennedy was the oldest of their children.
