**Glenda Gleave and "Patriot Dreams"**

Glenda Gleave, a descendant of Johannes Bellinger and Maria Magdalena Klock (Henrich Jr. and Hendrick Klock) lives in Salt Lake City, Utah and is an artist.

Johannes Bellinger and his two sons, John and Fredrick were killed at the battle of Oriskany on August 6, 1777. Johannes Bellinger and Maria Magdalena Klock had 10 children. Glenda is a descendant of Henry Bellinger who was the 8<sup>th</sup> child born from this union.

Glenda was a special guest at the 229<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Commemoration of the Battle of Oriskany on August 6, 2006. Glenda is an artist and her painting called "Patriot Dreams" was unveiled. Glenda, a full time artist with a custom designed studio in Salt Lake City. Her passion is creating oil portraits and historical art compositions. Glenda has been an artist all her life and has raised 6 children who are themselves accomplished artists and musicians. Her son was used as the model for her painting, "Patriot Dreams". Her beautiful portraits have won first place in the Freedom Festival Competition sponsored by Provo City, Utah and Brigham Young University. Her painting, Patriot Dreams found a home at the Oriskany Battlefield.

About 200 people gathered at the Oriskany Battlefield on Sunday, August 6, for the Anniversary Commemoration. Cathy Ossenfort, Darla, Ashley and I attended the event where

we were able to meet Glenda in person, although I have talked with her by e-mail in the past.

Hundreds of the Mohawk Valley patriots and their Oneida Indian allies were ambushed just outside the present-day village of Oriskany. The Battle of Oriskany was one of the bloodiest battles of the American Revolution and is considered the turning point of the revolution.

Several of our ancestors fought in this very important battle, including Col. Jacob Klock and his brother, Adam. Adam Klock, the son of Hendrick Klock, was killed on this battleground. Adam Klock, born in 1738 was about 40 when he died on this battlefield. The bodies of these patriot farmers were never recovered and were left to rot in the hot August sun.

We were able to meet Nate George, pictured in warrior's attire, at the Commemoration. Nate is a living historian with the Oneida Nation's First Allies Historical Program. We also met Brian Patterson, another Oneida Indian and his family. Brian sang the Iroquois Song of Condolence at the Commemoration. We were invited to take part in an Indian ceremony and eat a ceremonial Indian meal with Nate, Brian and his Oneida family before the start of the Commemoration Ceremony.

We forget how much the Indians suffered during the American Revolution and the important part they played in the early beginning of our county. "We were this county's first ally, and we have served in every conflict to this day", Brian said at Commemoration. While the DAR placed wreaths at the Oriskany Monument, the Oneida's placed offerings of food.
