## The Search Begins

Using my computer and the Census Record on Ancestry. Com, I found there were four Klocks families living in

Chambersburg, Pennsylvania in the 1930's.

David W. Klock, born about 1876  
married to May A. Klock.

John H. Klock, born about 1874, married  
to Ella I. Klock. Also living with John and  
Ella was John's mother Margaret H. Klock.

Robert B. Klock, born about 1905,  
married to Edna.

John A. Klock, born about 1874, married  
to Blanch. There was also a Paul J. Klock  
listed as living with his parents, born in  
1901, not married in 1930.

It was unlikely that David and May were  
the parents of Robert, little to old to have a  
child born in 1931. Same problem with John  
H. and his wife Ella and John A. Klock and  
his wife Blanch. But Robert B. Klock, born  
in 1905, married to Edna, were the right age.  
Figuring Robert B. Klock and his wife, Edna  
was the best fit for being the parents of  
Jason's Grandfather took me to the 1910  
Census.

I found Robert B. Klock in Chambersburg,  
Ward 2, Franklin, Pa. Robert was 5 years  
old, living with his parents, John A. Klock,  
(born about 1874) and his wife, Blanch. Paul  
J. Klock, age 9 was also listed as Robert's  
brother.

Checking the 1880 Census for Saint  
Thomas, Franklin, Pennsylvania, I found  
John A. Klock, age 6, born about 1874. He  
was living with his parents Daniel & Mary E.  
Klock.

Daniel Klock, 30, (born about 1850)  
Mary E. Klock, 32,  
Ivy R. Klock, 11,  
John A. Klock, 6  
Lula I. Klock, 4,  
Minnie B. Klock, 2.

Daniel Klock is listed as being born in  
Pennsylvania, with his parents born in  
Germany.

I found Daniel in the 1870 Census for  
Saint Thomas, Franklin, Pennsylvania.

Daniel Klock was listed as Daniel Clock, 21,  
listed with them was his wife Mary E., 23  
and daughter Ivy who was then 1. This was  
the right Daniel. Listed on the same page of  
this Census was Peter Clock, 59, Farm  
Labor, married to Margaret Clock, 57. Also  
listed on the same page was Jacob Clock, 24,  
Black Smith, and his wife Margaret, 21.  
This census says Peter was born in Germany.  
Could Peter Clock be the father of Daniel  
and Jacob?

On the 1860 Census I found Peter Clock.  
Listed with them, was Daniel, but Ancestry  
.com has him listed as being 17 years old.  
He should only be 11 not 17, but that could  
be a mistake on the census.

On the 1850 census I found Peter Clock,  
this time listed as Peter Cluck, 39, living in  
Peters, Franklin, Pennsylvania. Listed with  
his wife Margaret, 37, and three children,  
John, 10, Jacob, 4, and Daniel, 4/12. Peter is  
again listed as being born in Germany, with  
his wife and children being born in  
Pennsylvania.

It is really hard to trace anyone before  
1850 because census records really don't  
give much information, but the 1840 Census  
for Peters, Franklin, Pennsylvania did lists  
Peter as Peter Clack.

I could not find any record of Peter  
Klock/Clock/Cluck or Clack in the 1830  
census as living in Peters, Franklin,  
Pennsylvania. Peter probably came to  
America between 1830 and 1840.

**Forgotten Allies --The Oneida Indians**

“We have a rather narrow view of who participated in the Revolution,” according to Ray Halbritter, the leader of the Oneida Indian Nation. Ray Halbritter is right. When we think of the Revolutionary War, we think of the Red Coats, Hessian Soldier, the Continental Army, and the Militia. Seldom do we think about our Indian allies who gave their lives fighting for Independence.

The Oneidas, one of the six tribes of the Iroquois Confederacy, after attempts to remain neutral failed, decided to fight with the Americans. Some of the Tuscaroras joined the rebelling Americans, and the Oneidas in the fight, but the rest of the Six Nations went with the British.

On August 6, 1777, during the siege of Fort Stanwix, an American relief force from the Mohawk Valley under General Nicholas Herkimer, numbering around 800 men, was approaching to relieve the siege. British commander Barry St. Leger authorized an intercept force consisting of Sir John Johnson's King's Royal Regiment of New York, Native allies from the Six Nations and Seven Nations

of Canada, and Indian Department Rangers totaling at least 450 men.

The loyalist and native force ambushed Herkimer's force in a small valley about six miles east of Fort Stanwix. During the battle, Herkimer was mortally wounded. The battle cost the rebels approximately 450 casualties, while the loyalists and natives lost approximately 150 dead and wounded.

Several of our Klock and Klock connected ancestors fought at the Battle of Oriskany, including Col. Jacob Klock, his brothers, John and Adam Klock. Adam was killed. This battle, known as one of the bloodiest battles of the American Revolution, has the distinction of being one of the few battles of the war where all of the participants were North American. For the militia and the natives, this was more like a civil war. The British loyalists and Indian natives fought against the American rebels in the absence of British soldiers. Oneidas allied with the rebel army fought against members of the other Iroquois nations. Fighting side by side with rebel forces, the Oneidas distinguished themselves as fierce fighters.

A few weeks later, the Oneida warriors headed for the upper Hudson River where a large British force was marching toward Albany to cut off New England from the rest of the colonies. The Oneida's, using their forest fighting skills to scout for the Americans, harassed the British Redcoats, picked off the enemy troops, and took prisoners.

The following year, Oneida warriors made the long trek to Pennsylvania's Valley Forge to serve with General Washington and the Continental Army. General Washington praised his Indian allies for their perseverance and fidelity. "These people are not just patriots of American Indians nations," Ray Halbritter said. "They are America's patriots, and they have honored us with their bravery and sacrifice, we must honor them

with our remembrance".

Maybe in some small way this article will honor the memory of those Oneidas, who fought and died alongside our ancestors in the Revolutionary War. And remind us of the bravery and sacrifices made by the Oneidas, our Forgotten Allies.

Klock, Emma J. d. 8 Sept. 1861, 5y 3m, d/o Jonas & Lydia. Additional Information. Emma was the daughter of Jonas, (Joseph, Joseph Clock, Conrad Clock and Hendrick Klock).

Klock, Eugene B. d. 8 July 1861, 12-10-8, s/o Jonas & Lydia (drowned). Additional Information: Eugene was the son of Jonas (Joseph, Joseph Clock, Conrad Clock and Hendrick Klock).

Klock, Frank d. 19 Jan. 1931, 80-11-1, s/o John J. & Betsey Additional Information: Frank Klock, (John J. Jr. Clock, John J. Clock, Joseph Clock, Conrad Clock and Hendrick Klock) married Alice Tarbell.
