Anson and Elizabeth Edick



Anson Edick

Anson Edick was born in St. Johnsville, New York on September 24, 1822. He was the son of Daniel Edick and Maria "Huffer" Edick.

Anson Edick married Magdalena Elizabeth Klock in 1847. Elizabeth was the daughter of Thomas A. Klock (George I., Johannes, Han Henrich and Hendrick Klock) and Dorothy Putman. Anson and Elizabeth Edick moved near Chaumont in Jefferson County, New York. Later they moved to Tug Hill area in 1850-51 and built a House and Saw Mill on the

Pond Road. Anson and his sons ran the Saw Mill until some of his sons took up farming. Anson and Elizabeth had 13 children.

I recently met Shirley "Edick" Chambers and her daughter, Irene "Chambers" Orvis while they were visiting Fort Klock a few weeks ago. They showed me the genealogy information they had collected on their family and a few days later came back to the fort and gave me copies of their genealogy and copies of several old family pictures.

I already had some information on the family of Anson and Elizabeth Edick that was given to me by Sandy Waters Harrison a few years ago and from the Sherman O. Klock Genealogy. It's great when someone gives you new information and then these pieces of the puzzle start fitting together. When I was entering the information on my family tree maker program I got to thinking about Sandy Waters Harrison. We share the same Gr. Gr. Grandfather and we go back to Johannes Klock. Why would Sandy have information on Anson Edick and Magdalena Elizabeth Klock as Elizabeth goes back to Johannes's brother, Han Hendrick? Well my computer showed me the answer. My Gr. Gr. Grandfather, Isaac Klock married Lucy A. Hartwick and they had 10 children. Their oldest daughter, Diantha married Elon M. Waters. Now, Elon and Diantha Klock Waters had a son, Marvin Marcellus

Waters who married Gertrude Fuller. Now Gertrude Fuller was the daughter of Eugene Fuller and Alice A. Edick and Alice was the daughter of Anson Edick and Elizabeth "Klock" Edick. Well, that explains that connection and why Sandy would have information on Anson Edick and his family.

Anson Edick and Elizabeth had a large family, 13 children in all. One of the sons was named Klock Edick.

Klock was born April 30, 1858 and on February 25, 1882 he married Belle Lanpher. Klock and Belle also had a large family, eight children. One of those children was Leon Dwight Edick who married Ruth Agatha Terrillion and they had seven children. One was Shirley who married Glen Wilson Chambers. Shirley and her daughter, Irene are the ones who visited Fort Klock and gave me the information on their line.

The Edick Family lived in the Lowville area in Jefferson County and several of the extended family still lives in and around Jefferson County.

It is interesting to find all these old family names that are so prevalent in New York and the Mohawk Valley, keep popping up in my family tree.

Russell and Nellie Getman Continued

Last month in Klock Connections there was a story about Russell and Nellie Getman. Russell and Nellie were the first caretakers of Fort Klock. Willis "Skip" Barshied had purchased an old prayer book that once belonged to Russell and Nellie Getman. The prayer book was published in Germany about 1673. There was some hand writing in this book, but it was in German. Skip had the writing translated and below is what is written.

Johannes Klock, junior born to the world in year 1731, September the 1, married March 11 My conjugal wife, is Margaretha. With her procreate children following

Johannes Thomas, born 2nd January 1761, died 20th August 1761

Helena born in year 1762, August 20

Johannes born in year 1764, December 15, died in 1765, March 3.

This book belongs to me, Magdalena Klock from Stone Arabia in memory of my beloved father who bought it for me, so I can study intentionally the witty prayers so that I can reach the perception of the Lord

Additional Information:

Johannes Klock, born September 01, 1731, was the son of Han Henrich Klock and he was not a Junior as we would think of it today. The tradition at that time was if there was another Johannes living in the area, they would tack the Junior on the end of his name to distinguish him from the other Johannes. It did not always mean that he was the son of a Johannes. Johannes married Anna Margaretha Schumacher on March 11, 1760. They had four children; Johann Thomas; born Jan. 2, 1761 and died Aug. 20, 1761; Magdalena (Lena) Klock, who's middle name was probably Helena was born January 20, 1762. Magdalena watched the burial of about 25-30 American soldiers by her father, Johannes after the battles of Stone Arabia and Klock's Field.

Russell and Nellie Getman Continued

Magdalena Elizabeth or Helena Klock married Michael Bauder who was born January 14, 1762. He was the son of Melchoir and Barbara Beyers. Michael Bauder died December 25, 1822; age 60 years 11 months 14 days. buried in Stone Arabia Lutheran Trinity Church Cemetery. Magdalena or Helena Klock died 22 April 1838 aged 76 years, 4 months, and 28 days. She is buried in Stone Arabia Lutheran Trinity Church Cemetery. Michael and Magdalena had five children; The last child of Johannes Klock and Anna Margaretha Schumacher was George I. Klock. He is not listed in the prayer book, but he was born January 30, 1766, unknown why he was just not recorded in the prayer book. He married Barbara Bauder, the sister of Michael Bauder.

John Leonard Crouse

**From the Bloodied Mohawk by Ken D. Johnson,

He married in a ceremony performed by the minister of the German Reformed Church of Canajoharie, Montgomery County, New York on September 12, 1778 Magdalena Klock. He died in 1797. He served as a sergeant in Captain John Lafler's Company of Batteauxmen. He is stated to have fought in the Battle of Mudder's Creek. He also performed duties in the companies of Captain John Hess and John Zielly of the Palatine District Regiment of Militia. John Klock states the home of Crouse's Grandfather, John Klock, was fortified, and that he, Klock, was present in the house on October 19, 1780. Klock also stated that, during the Battle of Klock's Field, Leonard shot a British soldier and went out from Fort Klock to take the soldier's horse and baggage; and also that Sir John Johnson and his men first made their stand in Richard Failing's Orchard, about one mile west of his grandfather's house. Peter Fox states that he was present in Klock's Church when Jacob Crouse, the father of John Leonard Crouse, stood up and objected to his son's plans to marry Magdalena Klock. Henry A. Flanders states he served with Crouse in Captain John Lafler's Company of Batteauxmen. His file also contains a deposition by Crouse's daughter, Catherine Wood.

Additional Information: Magdalena Klock was the daughter of Johannes Klock and Ann Margaretha Fuchs. She married John Leonhardt (Krauss) Crouse. I do not know why John's father objected to the marriage of his son to Magdalena Klock. Perhaps he felt John was too young (18) or because Magdalena was about 8 years his senior. Whatever his reason, the marriage took place on May 12, 1778 in the German Reformed Church of Canajoharie.

John Crouse served in the Revolutionary War as Ken Johnson recorded in his book "The Bloodied Mohawk". I sometimes tell the story of how John Leonard Crouse shot and killed the British soldier when I give my tours. (I think he was an Officer of some sort, "Family History").

"It was October 19, 1780, John Klock and his son in law, John Leonard Crouse were watching from the deck that used to be on the front of the house, facing the river and Kings Highway, when two British soldiers road past. Crouse, musket in hand, shot and killed a British Officer. The other soldier did not look back to see where the shot came, or to check on the fate of the officer, he just continued on his way as fast as his horse could carry him. And then Crouse went from the house to retrieve the soldiers' horse and baggage."

How they disposed of the body of the soldier, I don't know, perhaps they just dumped it in the river. At any rate, this story is part of the history of Fort Klock and I enjoy giving tours and telling people about its' history.

I don't have a lot of information on the John Leonard Crouse or his family. He was born February 03, 1760 and died in 1797. Magdalena was born October 24, 1752 and died January 06, 1837. They had seven children; Anna Nancy, William, Catherine, Jacob, Lany, Elizabeth and Leonard. Anna married Christopher C. Fox; William married Catherine Miller; Catherine married a Wood and Leonard Crouse married Sally Loadwick.

Obituary of Manson D. Klock

**Syracuse Herald
September 5, 1917**

Manson D. Klock

The funeral of Mr. Klock, found dead yesterday in his home No. 208 Renwick Avenue, will be held Thursday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the undertaking rooms of W.A. Fancher, No 112 Seymour street. The service will be in charge of Root post No. 141 G.A.R. Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery.

Additional Information: I did not have much information on Manson Klock so I tried to see what I could find on him. Researching in census records I find he was the son of Conrad Clock (David Clock, Jacob Conrad Clock, Conrad Clock and Hendrick Klock) and Elizabeth Clock. I do not know Elizabeth's maiden name.

Manson was a Carpenter. He enlisted as a Private on 29 August 1864 at the age of 19. Enlisted in Company K, 184th Infantry Regiment New York on 15 Sep 1864. Mustered Out Company K, 184th Infantry Regiment New York on 29 Jun 1865 at City Point, VA. He was married twice. Married to Adell (Unknown) who died in 1903. Second to Melissa Ecker on Jan 19, 1904. She died in 1912. All three are buried in Oakwood Cemetery. I find no children listed in the census records.

Additional Information: Clair (Clare) Ortlieb Klock was born in Alexandria, New York, the son of Jacob Merton Klock (Adam, Jacob Adam, Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob Klock and Hendrick Klock) and Lucy Ann Ortlieb Klock. Clare was killed in Aacjem, Germany during World War II in the Battle of the Bulge. The Klock-Smith American Legion Post # 1788, located in Lafargeville, New York was named in part in his honor.

Klock, Lucy A. (Ortlieb) b. Nov. 20, 1880, d. July 28, 1977, wife of Jacob M. Klock. Additional Information, see above.

Klock, Pauline A. 1907-1917, daughter of J.M. & Lucy. Additional Information: Pauline was the daughter of Jacob Merton Klock and Lucy Ann Ortlieb. She was born March 27, 1907 and died October 23, 1917. Pauline died of Polio--Information from Yvonne Klock.

Pedroza, Martha J. (Klock) b. Dec. 2, 1941, d. Aug. 9, 1979, wife of N. Allen. Additional Information: Martha J. "Klock" Pedroza was the daughter of George Henry Klock (see line above) and Edna May Simmons. Martha married Allen Pedroza. (below). No record of any children.

Pedroza, N. Allen b. Nov. 22, 1931 d. June 19, 1965. Additional Information: N. Allen Pedroza was the spouse of Martha J. Klock (above).

Klock, Franklin E. b. Feb. 8, 1932 d. July 18, 2004 married Sept. 1956, Korea Army Vet. Additional Information: Franklin Vincent Klock was the son of George Henry Klock (see line above) and Edna May Simmons. He married

Virginia Jean Eichorn. I have no record of any children.

Klock, George E., 1890- 1974. Additional Information: Social Security Death Index has George E. Klock born Oct. 17, 1890, died 1974. Residence as Philadelphia, Jefferson Co., NY The Philadelphia, draft registration of George Erwin Klock gives his date of birth as Oct. 17, 1891. George was the son of James Klock (George, Jacob Adam, Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Jacob and Hendrick Klock) and Cora M. Crook. I have no record of any children.

Klock, Addie C. 1888-1969, daughter of James and Cora. Additional Information. Addie C. Klock was the daughter of James Klock (George, Jacob Adam, Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob and Hendrick Klock) and Cora M. Crook. No record of marriage or children.

Klock, Cora M. (Crook) 1865-1945, wife of James. Additional Information: Cora M. Crook married James Klock (see line above) on November 11, 1885. Cora and James had four children.

Klock, Cynthia F. 1893-1940, wife of Erastus C. Additional Information: I do not have the maiden name of Cynthia. She married Erastus Crook Klock, the son of Webster Klock and Fannie Crook. (See line below) Cynthia and Webster had a daughter; Virginia who was born about 1919.

Klock, Erastus C. 1892-1939. Additional Information: Erastus Crook Klock (Webster, (George, Jacob Adam, Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob and Hendrick Klock) married Cynthia above.

Klock, Fannie E. 1858-1917, wife of Webster. Additional Information: Fannie E. Crook married Webster Klock (George, Jacob Adam, Adam, Adam Johannes, Adam, Col. Jacob and Hendrick Klock). Fannie and Webster had four children.
